Jack's story is a reminder that even the most ordinary of dogs can find happiness and belonging. All they need is a little love and kindness.



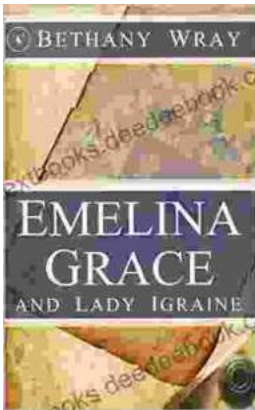
